We are saddened by the recent death of Branch member Abbie Joy Stodder Kleppa, who passed away July 29 at her home in the Carillon Retirement Community. A memorial service celebrating of her life held in August at Carillon Chapel. Joy grew up in, Minneapolis and Indiana. She and her late husband Ole, a native of Norway and a University of Chicago professor, spent almost 50 years in the Hyde Park community of Chicago. They moved to Lubbock in 2006 to be near their daughter Abbie. Ole passed away in 2007. Joy graduated from the University of Minnesota (1948) and she worked for many years as a Spanish teacher at Chicago's Faulkner School and the American School of Correspondence. She later taught adult ESL classes with the City Colleges of Chicago. After Joy's move to Lubbock, she immediately joined the Betty Anderson Branch and dived right in with her usual vivacity. She was a faithful member of the Calling Committee, regularly contributed food for the Mother Daughter Saturdays, and was part of the Cuisine Group. She is survived by two daughters, Abbie Lee Kleppa of Lubbock, and Karen Joy Kleppa of Gol, Norway, and several grandchildren who remember her fondly as a hiker, gardener, swimmer, skier and Girl Scout leader. She will certainly be missed!

Congratulations to **Kara Craig-Page.** Not only has she recently married, but she is starting a new business: Omni Pilates (<u>www.omnipilates.com</u>) at 4710 67<sup>th</sup> Street inside the Oasis Professional Plaza, Suite F. Kara, who is now a Certified Pilates Trainer, will offer private, semi-private and group classes. She explained Pilates this way: "More traditional types of fitness training tend to develop short and bulky muscles. This type of musculature is most prone to injury. Pilates elongates the spine, increasing the elasticity of muscles and the flexibility of joints: combining strength and flexibility that reduces potential for injury. "

At Omni Pilates, specialized equipment will allow for optimal workouts. Kara has seen the difference this type of exercise (combined with breathing, diet and daily movement) can make in her own experience and that of her family. Kara was diagnosed with an illness two years ago that made daily movements –like buttoning a shirt or going upstairs—difficult. Kara used Pilates to regain her physical fitness and abilities, and now she is helping others do the same. Our MD open-house tables at Atkins, Smylie Wilson, and OL Slaton gave each AAUW member who helped "woman" a table renewed energy and enthusiasm for our wonderful Mother-Daughter Program.

At Smylie Wilson, Adelaida Montemayor and Denyse Gammel report many contacts and two mothers signing an information sheet. At Atkins two mothers also signed an information sheet at the MD information table hosted by Denyse Gammel and Sebrina Carroll.

OL Slaton tables, hosted by Shelby Russell, Jessica Ortiz-Martinez, and Joy Vann, had 17 mothers sign an information form for Mother-Daughter. Wow! Probably not all will qualify for the program, but we saw first hand how enthusiastic and capable OL's new sponsor Jessica will be in sponsoring these girls. Unlike Atkins and Smylie Wilson, Jessica who works for Communities in Schools was able to join us at OL; her presence helped draw folks to our table.

Time will tell how many of these girls quialify as first-generation college students, but as Sebrina Carroll notes in her report, "I think it was good thing for us to put a face to the program. Hopefully they will join once school has started." Jessica Ortiz-Martinez kept brochurs for OL and hopes to explain our program at one of the teacher meetings before school starts.

Having the enthusiastic support of teachers and administrators in each middle school is so important. Shelby and I are very optimistic about this year as the principals at all three middle schools give the sponsors support and encouagement. Katina's unique role as counselor at Atkins helps her locate girls for the program and enables her to carve out a special time to meet with them. Holly at Smylie Wilson is jubilant about the coming year as she has been given a class period to meet with her girls. Principal Cindy Wallace at Smylie Wilson and Chris Huber at Atkins have given these two programs quality support for the last several years.

OL Slaton has a new principal this year, Trey Aguilar. Denise Mattson recently spoke with Mr. Aguilar, and he is adament in his enthusiasm and support of our program at OL Slaton. He is going to carve out time for Jessica to meet with her girls. We can do good things on our own, but a team of supporters who ban together to make a hopeful future for children can do so much more. This year we have an outstanding team in place.

With a tremendous outpouring of support from our members and others in the community, we raised enough funds to send 14 of our Mother-Daughter girls to camp this year.

# General News: Dr. Alice White Establishes \$25,000 Endowment Fund for AAUW Lubbock

Dr. Alice White, Life member of AAUW and member of the Lubbock Betty Anderson Branch since 2005, recently established a \$25,000 AAUW Lubbock Branch Endowment Fund through the Lubbock Area Foundation. It was given in honor of four members of the local branch: Cathy Allen, Lucy Barrington, Lane Powell, and Joy Vann.

According to Alice, "I named the endowment in honor of these four women because of their leadership, enthusiasm and admiration for AAUW and for the dynamic, effective Mother-Daughter Program."

Alice is a Kansas native who received her PhD from UT--Austin in 1991. She has been an AAUW member since 1969; served as President of the 105-member Dodge City (KS) Branch from 1971-73; and President of the 4,000-member, 64-branch Kansas Division from 1979-81. Her Kansas AAUW friends have donated to AAUW in her honor; she is a Named Gift Honoree by AAUW (1975, 1989 and 1991).

Her friend-making and communication skills\* have garnered recognition:

- 2006 Honorary Charter Member of Raiders Rojos National Alumni Association,
- 2007 White Carnation Tribute from community leader Eric Strong for having contributed to goodwill among the races,
- 2011 "Pacesetter" recognition from South Plains College,
- 2012 Gold Medalist from the Association of Women in Communication of Lubbock,

• Served as two-year president of the alumni association and one-year chapter historian during the years when both the PBK Association of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico and the Lambda of Texas Phi Beta Kappa Chapter each won a 2012 **national first-place award** with **\$1,000 prize** from The Phi Beta Kappa Society, and Selected 2013-2016 District 5730, 51-club Rotary Foundation Chair.

It was through Dr. White's efforts that more than 835 GO Centers (*Education: GO Get It*) comprise an e-network among Pre-Kindergarten through graduate and professional schools, businesses and non-profit organizations throughout the South Plains and beyond. The GO Center network helps families, youth, educators and business leaders prepare all Texas families to prepare for and succeed in college and life.

"For Alice to create this endowment in this manner is very humbling! She has been an integral part of AAUW and Lubbock for many years, and I look forward to her continued involvement for many more," stated Lucy Barrington, current Branch president.
